PREA FATIGUE: A REAL CHALLENGE, OFTEN OVERLOOKED, YET HIGHLY MODIFIABLE | Ballroom C

PREA Coordinators occupy one of the most isolated and high-liability roles in corrections — often understaffed, overextended, and operating with limited organizational support, despite the critical importance of their work. This plenary session shines a light on the overlooked emotional toll of managing continual exposure to sexual abuse allegations, including the exhausting churn of unfounded, retaliatory or vindictive reports alongside very real threats and traumatic incidents. Over time, this exposure can lead to cynicism, emotional numbing, and disengagement — conditions that can quietly undermine the PREA Coordinators' effectiveness and sustainability in their role, and even their overall wellbeing and quality of life. Participants will explore the concept of "PREA fatigue," how it develops within systems, and evidence-informed strategies agencies can use to recognize and address it early — before it contributes to burnout, trauma, disengagement, or overwhelm.

AVOIDING IMPLICIT BIAS IN INVESTIGATIONS | Terrace 215-216

Implicit bias is a universal truth. Not only does it exist within each of us, but it informs and affects our work. Join us for a lively discussion intended to push perspectives as we acknowledge, understand, and recognize the role of implicit bias in investigations. Participants will discuss the elements of implicit bias; the ways in which implicit bias can interfere in investigations; how to prevent implicit bias from impacting decision-making; and, ultimately, shift this truth into a productive tool.

CARE IN CUSTODY: MEDICAL FORENSIC EXAMS FOR INCARCERATED INDIVIDUALS | Ballroom C

Sexual violence in custodial settings presents complex challenges for correctional systems and healthcare providers alike. Understanding the components of the medical forensic examination is crucial to ensuring that victims of sexual violence receive timely, trauma-informed treatment. This session will provide an overview of best-practice approaches to conducting trauma-informed sexual assault medical forensic examinations for individuals in custody. Participants will learn the purpose and scope of the medical forensic exam, including victim-centered strategies for consent, privacy, and dignity. Throughout the presentation, practical considerations for responders to sexual violence in custodial settings will be reviewed, including opportunities to strengthen access to timely, high-quality forensic medical care following cases of sexual assault in correctional facilities.

THE SCIENCE OF SAFETY: USING RISK ASSESSMENT RESEARCH TO GUIDE PRACTICE | Terrace 210-212

PREA screening instruments are far more than compliance documents — they are essential safety tools. The information they capture influences housing placements, supervision levels, clinical and educational supports, and broader programming decisions that help prevent harm and promote successful adjustment. Although PREA provides a research-based framework for developing these instruments, few studies have assessed how well agency-developed tools actually predict risk. This session highlights Minnesota's effort to validate and strengthen its PREA screening instrument for adults in state prisons using actuarial methods. Through a close partnership between research staff and PREA compliance practitioners, the state created a gender-specific instrument that demonstrates strong predictive accuracy. The session will describe the development process, key findings, and ongoing implementation efforts.

CONTINUUM OF HARM | Terrace 215-216

This interactive train-the-trainer session demonstrates the *Continuum of Harm* activity, where participants individually and collaboratively rank varying forms of sexual victimization, misconduct, and boundary violations. Through guided discussion, attendees will explore the impact of harm on individuals, staff, facilities, professional integrity, and organizational culture while weaving sexual abuse dynamics, the PREA standards, and agency policy into each scenario. With no “right” answers, the exercise challenges assumptions, examines normalization of harmful behavior, and highlights the role of the bystander in interrupting cultures of violence, misconduct, and harm. Participants will leave with practical tools to facilitate the activity within their own agencies.

Words aren't just words — they shape decisions, influence actions, and define outcomes. In the world of PREA compliance, language can be the difference between confusion and clarity, reaction and resolution. This workshop seeks to help move beyond the acronym and embrace intentional communication that drives safety and accountability. In youth justice settings, PREA is often used as a catch-all term for concerns that do not actually fall under the standards. When language is unclear, responses can become inconsistent, disproportionate, or driven by fear instead of facts. Participants will revisit key PREA definitions, identify common misuses of terminology, and strengthen first-response approaches that align with both the letter and spirit of the standards.

Session Descriptions

CULTURE EATS POLICY FOR BREAKFAST: TURNING PREA COMPLIANCE INTO CULTURE CHANGE | *Ballroom C*

Brian Koehn, Social Purpose Corrections

Most facilities can recite PREA policy. Fewer can honestly say staff and residents trust the system enough to use it. This session reframes PREA as what it has always been at its core: a culture standard. When the culture is healthy, compliance is easier, reporting is more credible, investigations move faster, staff intervene earlier, and audits become confirmation rather than crisis management. Drawing on real-world experience leading culture change in multiple prisons, Brian Koehn outlines a practical operating perspective that turns PREA from a binder into behavior. Attendees will hear how facilities build reporting confidence without creating chaos, how first-line supervisors set the tone every shift, and how risk becomes normalized when culture is not actively managed. Participants will leave with a clear understanding of the culture levers and strategies that shape daily behavior, whether they are facility leaders or operational influencers.

SEDUCTION'S SLIPPERY SLOPE | *Ballroom C*

Corrections fatigue doesn't just affect morale — it can elevate risk. This interactive workshop examines how chronic stress, emotional depletion, and blurred boundaries increase vulnerability to sexual misconduct, whether initiated by staff, incarcerated individuals, or both. Participants will unpack the psychological and organizational dynamics that make misconduct more likely in fatigued systems and review agency-level strategies to interrupt these risk pathways early. Special emphasis is placed on the role of PREA Coordinators in supporting staff wellbeing, reinforcing healthy boundaries, and partnering with leadership to reduce misconduct risk. The focus is on proactive, prevention-oriented practices that sustain professionalism — rather than relying solely on outward compliance or reactive responses after misconduct occurs.

LEVERAGING AI: PRACTICAL GUARDRAILS, REAL RISKS, AND RESPONSIBLE USE | *Terrace 210-212*

Artificial intelligence tools are increasingly appearing in correctional environments — sometimes formally, often informally. Many PREA professionals are using AI to help with summaries, training materials, and policy interpretation, while uncertainty around privacy, liability, and agency policy creates both hesitation and risk. This session examines how AI intersects with PREA work today, including common misconceptions about privacy and confidentiality when using external AI systems. Participants will explore potential risks, practical guardrails, and responsible use cases such as investigative documentation support, training development, and policy analysis. This is not a technology pitch, but a practical conversation about using AI thoughtfully and responsibly in PREA-related work.

ARE YOUR PREA IMPLEMENTATION PRACTICES TRAUMA INFORMED? | *Terrace 215-216*

The PREA standards provide the framework for what needs to be done to prevent, detect, and respond to sexual abuse and sexual harassment. The implementation — the how — is left up to us to figure out. Have you looked critically at your agency's "how" and whether or not these approaches are trauma-informed? Take, for example, searches. Nobody likes them — staff or incarcerated people — yet they are important for safety and security. Could they be doing more harm than good? How can searches be done to balance safety and security AND minimize trauma? This session will tease apart a handful of the PREA standards to look at typical implementation and whether or not they are trauma-informed. Breakout groups will work collaboratively to look at current practices and what might cause trauma, and then develop trauma-informed solutions to share with the larger group. Participants will leave the session with an increased understanding of how to evaluate and revise PREA policies and practices through a trauma-informed lens.

FACILITY TYPE FORUM SERIES

Every correctional setting faces unique PREA implementation challenges. These facilitated forum sessions bring together professionals from similar facility types to engage in candid discussion, exchange ideas, and learn from one another's experiences. In an open, participant-driven format, attendees will explore emerging issues, share practical solutions, and discuss strategies that address the realities of their specific environments. Whether seeking advice, offering insight, or simply connecting with peers who understand your challenges, these forums provide a valuable opportunity for collaboration, problem-solving, and professional support.

INVESTIGATIONS 101: BUILDING A MULTI-DISCIPLINARY FOUNDATION | *Ballroom C*

The key to effectively investigating allegations of sexual abuse and sexual harassment is building a solid foundation of understanding. During this presentation, participants will learn the value of a strong multi-disciplinary approach. We will discuss developing investigative guidelines, credibility assessments, the role of the PREA compliance manager, and how to successfully manage the complexities of these important, sensitive investigations.

The session will also focus on the practical implications of these findings, offering prevention strategies, discussion points, and considerations for agencies seeking to strengthen professional boundaries, reduce risk, and enhance staff accountability. Leadership plays a critical role in sustaining PREA compliance, yet many agencies struggle when decision-makers lack awareness or underestimate the importance of PREA requirements. This session focuses on bridging that gap by equipping participants with strategies to engage leadership, clarify responsibilities under federal standards, and reinforce the connection between compliance and organizational success.

INVESTIGATIONS: BEYOND THE BASICS | *Ballroom C*

This workshop explores responding to people who repeatedly report allegations that are eventually deemed unsubstantiated or unfounded. Is a full investigation necessary with each allegation? What might an abbreviated investigation look like? We will also discuss other investigative complexities, to include: how investigations may be impacted when the reporting inmate is mentally ill or cognitively limited; how to manage allegations that may be both criminal and administrative in nature (and whether they should occur simultaneously); what happens when an allegation initially reported as sexual harassment or sexual abuse turns out to be neither and how that affects data reporting; and more!

BEYOND POLICY: ETHICAL JUDGMENT IN PREA COMPLIANCE | *Terrace 210-212*

PREA Coordinators operate at the intersection of safety, accountability, and institutional culture — and the ethical challenges they face are often complex and rarely discussed. We will look at how organizational culture, leadership expectations, and internal scrutiny can unintentionally encourage costly shortcuts, suppress reporting, or affect audits — and how these pressures ultimately undermine trust and compliance. The class examines the ethical implications of loyalty norms, conflicts of interest, and compromised investigative practices, as well as the importance of confidentiality in all PREA programs. Participants will gain practical insights into recognizing ethical red flags, how to avoid ethical pitfalls, and strengthening a culture that truly supports PREA's mission.

TAKE TIME TO BREATHE AND CELEBRATE RESILIENCE | Terrace 215-216

Are you a PREA Coordinator and tired of returning investigative packets for noncompliance? Are you an investigator and frustrated when yours is returned? If so, let's talk! PREA Coordinators play a critical role in ensuring investigations meet both the letter and spirit of the PREA Standards. This session is not a course on investigative techniques, but rather an exploration of the key investigative elements that drive compliance and strengthen outcomes. Topics will include timeliness, thorough documentation, credibility assessments, witness interviews, evidence collection, investigative review, and other indicators of a complete and compliant investigation. Participants will learn how PREA Coordinators can support quality assurance, identify common gaps, and work collaboratively with investigators to promote consistency, accountability, and best practice across their agencies.

YOUTH RISK ASSESSMENTS: FROM INTAKE TO IMPACT | Terrace 210-212

PREA audits are designed to protect vulnerable populations and uphold accountability in correctional facilities. But when audits feel "easy" or auditors lean toward leniency, the true purpose of compliance can be lost. The closing session of any conference carries a risk: attendees leave energized but overwhelmed, unsure how to translate three days of learning into meaningful change back home. This session is designed to eliminate that gap.

In this interactive capstone experience, PREA Coordinators will revisit key themes and takeaways from across the conference — and do the hard work of turning insight into action. Using a structured planning process, participants will build a prioritized roadmap for post-conference implementation, with an intentional focus on one of the most challenging dimensions of sustainable PREA operations: leveraging the team around you.

Whether by circumstance, capacity, or culture, PREA Coordinators often feel that they carry the responsibility for implementation alone. This session challenges that model directly — helping participants identify who else needs to be at the table, what roles they play, and how to engage them effectively — even in resource-strapped environments. Attendees will leave with a concrete, personalized action plan and a clearer picture of the agency-wide infrastructure required to make it stick.

DARCY ACOSTA is the Quality Improvement Manager and PREA Coordinator for the Idaho Department of Juvenile Corrections, where she oversees statewide quality improvement efforts, internal audits, policy review, and PREA compliance. She brings more than 18 years of experience in corrections and juvenile justice, including roles with the Idaho Department of Correction and Management & Training Corporation. Her longest position was as Deputy Warden of a prison that provided substance abuse and cognitive programming to adult males. Darcy has extensive expertise in compliance oversight, program management, contract monitoring, and conducting PREA and operational audits across both adult and juvenile facilities. She holds a Master's degree in Criminal Justice from the University of Cincinnati, a Bachelor's degree in Secondary Education from Arizona State University, and is an ACA Certified Correctional Executive.

MICIAH AHRNSBRAK began in the agricultural and correctional industries for the Oklahoma Department of Corrections in 2019. She moved to PREA as an Administrative Assistant in 2020, promoted to PREA Manager (secondary coordinator) in 2021, and promoted to PREA Coordinator in 2023, where she has remained. While in PREA she has coordinated 41 audits and, last year, beat the agency record by obtaining 24 exceeds standards in a single facility audit.

CALEB ASBRIDGE is a Project Director with The Moss Group and brings more than 25 years of experience in criminal justice leadership, compliance, training development, operational improvement, and grant and project management. Since 2005, he has worked extensively in the area of Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) implementation and has provided technical assistance to agencies across the country to strengthen compliance, improve operational practice, and enhance safety in confinement settings.

She has been a certified PREA auditor since 2023 and has participated in the PREA audit process since 2016. Heather has experience working with jails, prisons, detention centers, and community confinement facilities of all sizes and stages of PREA implementation.

Heather now owns a PREA consulting firm called The PREA Lady and is an active auditor. She conducts training, investigations, and cultural assessments, along with assisting agencies who are implementing the PREA standards and developing policy. She is passionate about sexual safety and making correctional environments safer places to live and work.

TAMMY BARBETTO began her career with the Virginia Department of Corrections (VADOC) in 1997, serving for two decades at a maximum-security adult male facility. In June 2017, she transitioned to the Department's PREA Unit when she was promoted to PREA/ADA Analyst for the Western Region. Her leadership and expertise led to her promotion in December 2020 to PREA/ADA Supervisor (Agency PREA Coordinator).

In November 2024, Mrs. Barbetto was appointed as Corrections Operations Manager, still supervising the PREA Unit and the ADA Unit, but her oversight expanded to include the Correspondence Unit and the LEP Coordinator. She is a DOJ Certified PREA Auditor, a Subject Matter Specialist, and an ACA Certified Corrections Manager, bringing a wealth of knowledge and a strong commitment to operational excellence and compliance.

JOHN BARKLEY is currently the PREA Coordinator for the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department. Prior to this position, John was the PREA Coordinator for the South Carolina Department of Corrections (SCDC) and was hired as the first PREA Coordinator for the department in August 2012. John worked for the South Carolina Department for over 25 years. Before serving as the PREA Coordinator for SCDC, he was an associate warden at a maximum-security prison, and prior to that post, he was the SCDC Public Information Officer. In 2015, John was selected by DOJ as one of 48 auditors to participate in the first Field Training Audit Program where a mock audit was completed, and the auditor's work was critiqued. John has audited and provided technical assistance to state prisons and county jails across the country.

CARLA BENNETT-WELLS is the PREA Coordinator for the Texas Juvenile Justice Department (TJJD), a role she has held since 2018. She is responsible for the statewide implementation, management, and oversight of the National PREA Standards across all TJJD secure facilities and halfway houses. Her involvement with PREA began in 2014 as the PREA Compliance Manager for one of TJJD's juvenile facilities. She has spent more than a decade on PREA implementation efforts and a total of 19 years in juvenile corrections for the State of Texas. She is certified by the U.S. Department of Justice as a PREA Auditor for juvenile facilities, holds a Bachelor's degree in Industrial-Organizational Psychology from the University of Phoenix, and recently earned the Praesidium Guardian certification.

GRETA CLARK is a Supervisory Survey Statistician in the Criminal Justice Statistics Branch at the U.S. Census Bureau, where she leads a team of three staff members and three interns. With more than 25 years of experience at the Census Bureau, she has supported major Bureau of Justice Statistics data collections, including the Survey of Sexual Victimization (SSV) and the Deaths in Custody collections. Recognized as the Census Bureau's subject matter expert on the SSV, she has worked on the project since the passage of the Prison Rape Elimination Act in 2003 and oversees the full survey lifecycle. It was during her time as a nurse and nurse manager in the emergency department that she recognized the critical need for competent, trauma-informed healthcare professionals for victims of sexual violence. After becoming trained as a SANE in 2020, Brittany began to assist the West Virginia Foundation for Rape Information and Services (WVFRIS) by providing training to nursing professionals in WV.

Since 2024, Brittany has worked as the WV SANE Coordinator. In her position, she trains and provides technical assistance to healthcare professionals seeking to work as medical forensic examiners and hospitals seeking to develop medical forensic programs. In addition to her full-time role, Brittany continues to practice as both an emergency medicine nurse and forensic nurse examiner for pediatric/adolescent and adult/adolescent populations in the northern panhandle of West Virginia. She remains committed to strengthening trauma-informed systems of care and supporting multidisciplinary approaches to improving responses to sexual violence throughout West Virginia.

CHEYENNE EVANS currently serves as the Agency PREA Coordinator and Litigation Specialist for the Hawaii Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation. With nearly three decades of dedicated service, she oversees the full lifecycle of PREA implementation, maintenance, and compliance across all state correctional institutions, ensuring rigorous adherence to National PREA Standards.

Her expertise bridges the gap between administrative litigation and "boots-on-the-ground" operations. This unique perspective is rooted in 20 years of uniformed service, including her tenure as a supervisor and Compliance Manager at the Women's Community Correctional Center. Today, she leverages that deep institutional knowledge to supervise

facility Compliance Managers, revise agency-wide policy, and train the next generation of staff through specialized academy and investigations courses.

As a DOJ-certified PREA Auditor and Computer Voice Stress Analysis (CVSA) Examiner, Cheyenne brings a multifaceted approach to agency integrity and complex staff investigations. In her role as Statewide PREA Coordinator, Ms. Garza leads agency-wide efforts to ensure full compliance with the Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) and oversees sexual abuse investigations across both state-operated and provider-operated programs. Ms. Garza oversees compliance operations within 12 state-operated detention and treatment facilities and six contracted residential programs. She provides leadership in fostering supportive facility cultures, guiding policy development and revision, and delivering training to new employees through the DHS Training Academy. She also facilitates the agency's Internal PREA Workgroup and collaborates with executive leadership, facility administrators, and external partners to promote a culture of safety, transparency, and accountability.

AMBER GIBBS serves as the Regional PREA Compliance Manager for the Vermont Department of Corrections, bringing nearly two decades of experience across the Vermont mental health system, correctional system, compliance, and workforce development. Her career began on a maximum-security male admissions unit at the Vermont State Psychiatric Hospital and has spanned both sides of the correctional system inside the fence as a caseworker and outside as a probation officer. Across every role, her work has been guided by a single belief: compliance is not a checklist, it is a culture.

Amber is a strategic leader who transforms complex federal mandates into clear, achievable practice. She leads the Department's PREA audit readiness efforts with precision and purpose aligning policy, driving operational consistency, and delivering immersive, scenario-based training that prepares staff to perform when it matters most. Her impact is measurable. Across facilities and at the regional level, Amber has redefined what audit readiness looks like, shifting it from a reactive event to a sustained, system-wide standard. She builds infrastructures that hold, processes that scale, and teams that are not only prepared but confident, capable, and accountable.

As a certified instructor in crisis intervention, traumatic stress management, and resiliency, Amber brings both intensity and intention to her work. She develops high-impact training that strengthens decision-making under pressure, reinforces professional integrity, and supports the long-term resilience of the workforce.

TARA GRAHAM, MPH, is JDI's National Program Director, based in its Washington, D.C. office. She provides training and technical assistance to corrections agencies on preventing and responding to sexual abuse in detention. She has been working on the development and implementation of the Prison Rape Elimination Act standards for more than 15 years, including at the National PREA Resource Center. Her research experience includes interviewing homeless and runaway youth and incarcerated women about issues including drug use, sexual behaviors, and experience with physical and sexual violence. Previously, Tara served as a Peace Corps Volunteer in Tanzania working on HIV/AIDS prevention with an emphasis on women and youth.

ERIN HICKEY is the PREA and Juvenile Records Manager for the North Carolina Department of Public Safety – Division of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. She began her career with NCDPS in 2006 as a case manager within the Division of Prisons. She has a diverse background, with work experience in inmate case management, sexually violent offender studies, division-level diagnostic program coordination, and served as the Juvenile Justice PREA Program Coordinator prior to assuming her current role.

She began working with juvenile justice in 2013 and has focused on developing, implementing, and evaluating policies addressing different populations and settings in a variety of subject matters across the juvenile justice system. She was heavily involved in North Carolina's efforts to raise the maximum and minimum ages of juvenile jurisdiction, working with stakeholders across the spectrum to develop training and policy consistent with legislative requirements. Ms. Hickey has a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice/Criminology and a Master of Public Administration from North Carolina State University and focuses her work on systemic improvements to policy and operations that are evidence-based, research-informed, and focused on affirming treatment philosophies

Grounded in lived experience, Shannon is committed to dismantling systemic barriers and advancing sustainable, youth-centered solutions rooted in justice and accountability. She leads multi-agency efforts including the Collaborating for Youth and Public Safety Initiative and the OJJDP Building Local Continuums of Care to Support Youth Success project—advancing equitable, community-based strategies that reduce justice involvement and address racial and ethnic disparities.

LORI MCGRADY is a licensed attorney with extensive experience in legal compliance and regulatory oversight for correctional and rehabilitation facilities. 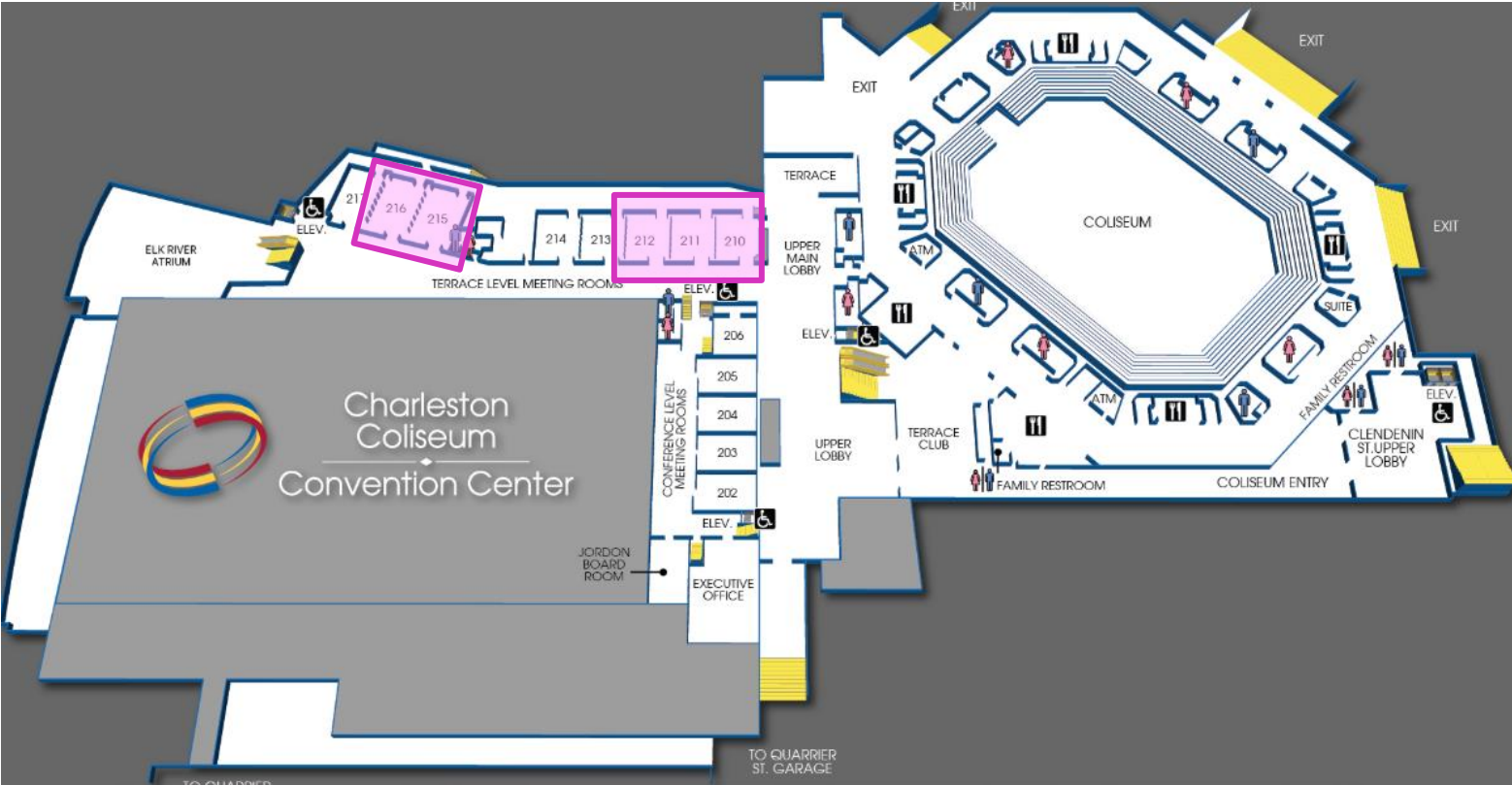

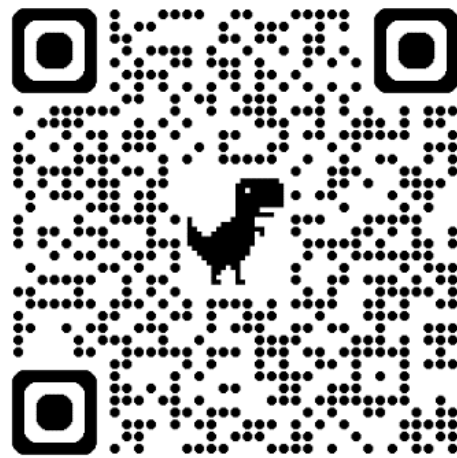
